The Workforce Development Department at Veterans Place recently participated in a leadership training event led by renowned Leadership & Business Consultant, Jeff Hancher. The 8hour workshop, hosted by ac Marriott Hotel – Canonsburg, ran the gamut of subject matter pertaining to the best practices of effective leaders, from trust-building exercises to live situational analysis case studies engineered to stimulate creative problemsolving in the thought processes of participants.

"I think the activities were the centerpiece of the training," remarks Vanesa Hart, the newest addition to the Veterans Place Workforce Development team. "There was so much for everyone to take away and apply to ourselves, regardless of position." Hart, who graduated from Point Park University last year with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Clinical Psychology, recently joined Veterans Place as an Employment Specialist. In this role, she has the responsibility of working with homeless veterans to build a positive and efficient basis of habits necessary to reintegrate into the professional sector. A formidable task for a department that coordinates job placement for homeless vets throughout Southwestern Pennsylvania.





"We have a ton of work to do, even with what we have managed to accomplish thus far," says Earl Lamar, the tenured Manager of Workforce Development for Veterans Place. "The most important thing we can do is invest in the people that we are counting on to do the work. That comes with training on how to talk to people, so that you can achieve the desired outcomes."

With renovations well underway on the new home of the Workforce Development Department, Building 919, the department looks to match the undertaking with equally ambitious initiatives pointed towards enhancing service output for veterans. 2024 is slated to be a transformative step in the realization of the greater mission of Veterans Place, and there's no question that the footprint left behind will read: Workforce Development.




EMPOWERING TRANSITIONS: A MAJOR STEP
